

'ECOLE DE LA SAGESSE'

CATHOLIC SCHOOL, VATOMANDRY

You might know the country of Madagascar because of the fictional cartoon movies. But what you might not know about the reality of this small island country is that, tragically, access to clean water for washing, cleaning, cooking and drinking is extremely scarce, and really only available to the wealthy few. Distressingly, due to the urgent lack of clean water and proper sanitation, thousands of children across Madagascar die from easily preventable diseases like diarrhoea every year.*

Nine year old Justin and eight year old Christelle, two of the students at the 'Ecole de la Sagesse' Catholic School in the city of Vatomandry on the east coast of Madagascar, have both been repeatedly ill because of the lack of water at the school.

The sad reality is that only a few years ago, there was no running water at Justin and Christelle's school, meaning that the children could not wash their hands after going to the bathroom or playing outside. With the area around the school constantly being dirty and smelly, the children were falling sick all the time.

As Justin says, "The dirty water made me sick. I often had diarrhoea. It also made me vomit." Christelle was also affected: "I remember having worms; I had a belly ache and I was throwing up. Many of my friends got sick."

Sister Rose Rasoavololona from the Daughters of Wisdom congregation has run the 'Ecole de la Sagesse' Catholic School for the past twelve years, and during this time she has seen many children fall desperately ill, with several students even passing away because of water-borne diseases and lack of proper sanitation.
